TU B'SHVAT SEDER KIT

What is Tu B'Shvat? Tu B'Shvat (ט"ע – also spelled Tu Bishvat), the 15th day of the month of Shevat, is known in Jewish tradition as **The Birthday of the Trees.** Traditionally, it's regarded as one of four Jewish New Years within each calendar cycle (the others being Rosh Hashanah, Passover, and Rosh Hashanah LaBehema, a minor holiday in late summer).

We celebrate Tu B'Shvat by having a **Seder** together. In Jewish ritual, a seder — seder being the Hebrew word for "order" — is a ceremonial meal that follows a predetermined structure (they're not just for Passover!).
